Snowdrops came and went and now the lambs are in the fields, daffodils are nodding in the breeze and there's frog spawn in the pond; spring is definitely on the way. Lambs appeared early in the fields around Pendarren, some in February, but on higher ground they are only just being born.

There has been very little snow – unlike the last two winters, no staff had to walk to work this winter (2 miles round trip through the fields). It also meant that no courses had to leave early or were postponed due to the weather. It was still cold at times, though!

Like the rest of the country, we had unseasonably warm weather at the end of March. The schools visiting Pendarren had a fantastic time, wearing t-shirts on some days. Let's hope that we haven't just experienced the 2012 Welsh summer!

Sadly, a dead otter was found on the road just a few hundred metres from Pendarren House. It was a young male which had been hit by a car. Otters are protected under UK and European Law so the death had to be reported to the Environment Agency, who collected the animal and transported it to Cardiff University where the "Otter Project" will study it for information regarding health and diet. Before the otter was taken to Cardiff, the visiting students had a unique opportunity to see this secretive, nocturnal creature. We feel privileged to know that otters are re-establishing themselves in the river close to Pendarren House.

Activities

The Night Sky – some schools took the opportunity of the clear night skies to do a bit of star gazing. Seven Sisters Primary discovered the beautiful constellation of ... Seven Sisters. In March there were no less than 3 planets easily visible in the evening sky – Venus, Jupiter and Mars. Saturn and Mercury were there too, but Saturn is faint and Mercury is always low in the sky near sunrise or sunset and therefore harder to spot.



National Science and Engineering week, which took place this year between 9 and 18 March, shines the spotlight on how science, technology, engineering and maths relate to our everyday lives and helps to inspire the next generation of scientists with fun and participative activities. With this in mind, we hope to develop the night sky as a winter evening activity and to find ways to include maths in the diary sheets. Allegedly we have a telescope in the attic somewhere, when we locate it we will see if it can be put into use!

The Greig Annexe
