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## News

#### Trees

We received 450 trees from the Woodland Trust in October and, with Pendarren staff supplying the spades, the pupils of Mulberry Primary, Stroud Green Primary, Chestnuts Primary and Belmont Junior Schools set about planting the trees adjacent to our existing wood. The sheep have generally behaved themselves and not eaten the trees; they will soon be taken off the field to go back to their farm for a couple of months. In their absence we will be erecting a fence to protect our new wood. More trees will be on the way in spring.

In the grounds we have a variety of trees including three giant sequoias, horse chestnut, sycamore, fir trees, scots pine, oak, beech, hazel, cherry, ash, larch and poplar. Many of the trees at Pendarren are very old and recently we have lost a mature oak, a silver birch and a sycamore. In addition to this the larch and ash trees are struggling with disease and so we could lose more trees. If your school would like to donate and plant a specimen tree then please get in touch, you can bring it with you or arrange to have it delivered here.





#### Weather

The weather this autumn has not been as cold as some previous autumns. We have had some snow on the mountains but it has not affected the activities for the pupils.

#### Wildlife

A pine martin was recorded in Wales for the first time in 40 years. The last one was found near Talybont on Usk, just up the valley from Pendarren House and is now in Cardiff Museum (one of the best museums in Britain if you are ever visiting). Pine martins are very rare and elusive creatures, they are one of the mammals that the Vincent Wildlife Trust is working on to learn more about its distribution and habits.





We received a license to evict the solitary bat in the Annexe cupboard – by November it had departed, probably to join its fellow bats hibernating in Agen Allwedd across the valley. Last winter over 500 Lesser Horseshoe bats were recorded in this cave. We have blocked the large ventilation holes in the wall (required when the building used to be a stable) which will help us to reduce heat loss from the Annexe.

## St Ignatius RC Primary School 22-26 October 2012

The coach arrived at Pendarren House and the pupils of St Ignatius all looked very excited. A welcome followed and a tour of Pendarren House. Imagine just one gentleman living here when it was built in 1876! He was not all alone, however, he did have servants to look after him. The house maintains the look and feel of a country manor house of old - very grand.

After lunch everyone was issued with waterproof jackets, trousers and wellington boots before setting off to explore the countryside around Pendarren.

The pupils met with many varied challenges during the week. Mountain and adventure walks, high ropes and canoeing. They also learnt about community living, helping with chores and keeping their rooms tidy. Bushcraft provided an opportunity to learn practical skills by making shelters and cooking on a campfire. Local culture and history was appreciated with visits to Big Pit Mining Museum and the market town of Abergavenny. So much to explore, so much to learn.



Mulberry Primary School 5-9 November 2012

Mulberry Primary School pupils arrived for a week of education, fun and challenge. Monday was very busy with some pupils walking along the local River Grwyney, taking in the lovely scenery, and others building shelters and toasting marshmallows over a campfire. In the evening, it being the 5th November, everyone went outside to see the bonfire – Guy Fawkes Night! The bonfire burnt brightly and there was a firework display with rockets and brilliant flashes of all colours; not to mention some very loud bangs. Pupils wrote their names in sparkly red, orange and silver. And that was just Monday! During the rest of the week, rivers, caves, waterfalls and the seaside were all explored and studied. There was also time for pupils to be challenged on the high ropes, climbing high, testing their nerve and balance and 'learning the ropes'. A brilliant week! Pupils left us some art work of the fireworks to use in displays.



#### Stroud Green Primary School 12–16 November 2012

Pupils of Stroud Green Primary School were extremely helpful when, shortly after their arrival, they helped plant about 100 trees which were donated to Pendarren by the Woodland Trust as part of their Jubilee project. The children were very enthusiastic and most trees were given names, for example "Robby the rowan tree".

Everyone was kept warm during the bushcraft session afterwards, sitting round the open fire and drinking scrummy hot chocolate which was made on the fire. Some people even had seconds. It's safe to say that pupils and the miner at Big Pit had a good laugh together when the pupils arrived with their waterproof jackets smelling of smoke. The miner wanted to know if it was safe to take the children into the coal mine!

Everyone really enjoyed Daniel the story teller whilst the Pendarren quiz was popular too.

#### DEVELOPMENTS

#### **AALS Inspection**

An Inspector from the Adventure Activity Licensing Service visited Pendarren House during the last week of term and accompanied a group of pupils from Bounds Green School, with their Pendarren instructor and teaching staff, on an adventure journey activity session. Afterwards he discussed the work of the Centre, and the operating procedures involved with Andy, the Head of Centre. At the end of his visit he concluded that Pendarren House had passed the inspection and granted a licence for the next two years.

#### **Refurbishment of the Main House**

The refurbishment work continues. There is only a small team of builders so the work is progressing, albeit slowly. Dave, the Pendarren maintenance officer, has been crafting inserts to replace rotten pieces of some of the ornate bargeboards. One of the chimney pots on the main roof required repairs, which has meant some very interesting scaffolding!

The emergency lighting throughout all of the Pendarren buildings has also been refurbished.

#### Kit

Some of the waterproofs and wellington boots were beginning to show their age, so we have purchased new waterproofs and wellies for the winter.

#### FRIENDS OF PENDARREN

The Friends of Pendarren have continued to support the work of the Centre by buying two replacement cameras for use by visiting groups. This saves the schools the worry of bringing their own cameras, or of ensuring that pupils don't lose or damage their own! The cost of a CD is £2.50.

Pendarren currently has a CD copier which can do several copies at a time. This is now quite a few years old and, especially as photographs taken by the new cameras take quite a lot of disc space, it is hoped The Friends will help out by buying a DVD copier so that in future we can supply DVDs instead.

A selection of games and board games have been purchased by The Friends fo use by visiting staff and pupils. They will be stored in the House and Annexe Common Rooms.
