The anticipated snow finally arrived on Friday 18 January 2013. Red warnings from the weather forecasters on Thursday were correct as, overnight, South Wales was carpeted in thick snow and over the following week 40-50 cm fell. There was very little wind so the snow was piled high on branches and telegraph wires. Two primary schools were in residence at Pendarren at the time of the snow – both had to get up very early on Friday morning in order to travel safely back to Haringey. Read the news from our visiting schools to see if you can work out which schools they were!





The snow around Pendarren melted after a week and all returned to normal. The snowdrops are out now, heralding the arrival of spring, and there are a few lambs to be seen in the fields. There has been some very heavy rain which, fortunately, has not caused flooding in the area but it does mean that the rivers are high. The instructors have been out in their spare time enjoying some exciting canoe sessions.

The scaffolding around the Main House has finally been taken down after 8 months. A number of draughty windows and leaks have been cured and all the external woodwork has been repainted. The Centre looks very smart in time for spring.





After Christmas BT disconnected one of our phone lines by mistake which left us without our fax and our usual @pendarren.org emails for a whole month. Without access to our office network of emails, it meant some inventive movement of files to our Haringey email system. This resulted in the Booking Applications for the 2013/2014 academic year being sent out a little later than planned. Hopefully no one was inconvenienced too much.

The closing date for the booking applications has passed and the response has been terrific. We are working hard to ensure that every school that has applied will get a week of their choosing. Thank you to everyone for continuing to support Pendarren House and the Pendarren Experience.

SECONDARY SCHOOLS - HOW CAN YOU USE PENDARREN?



We have produced a new secondary booklet (available to download from our website) that sets out in more detail how secondary schools can use us – it summarises aspects of the various syllabi that we can deliver at Pendarren: GCSE, BTEC and A Level PE, Geography, Science, Leisure and Tourism. Students can leave Pendarren with modules or marks towards their examinations. A 5 day course equates to around 40 hours teacher/student contact time and the student can focus on one activity.

We have witnessed over the last year that, due to increasing pressures in schools, many secondary schools struggle to send groups of students for Monday to Friday residential visits. As a consequence, we have taken bookings for shorter courses with more specific aims and objectives. Examples have been weekend visits as a "reward" for recognition of hard work; two night mid-week visits for targeted maths work; and, as you read earlier, two night visits for A2 Level Geography students studying specific areas of the curriculum.



The Pendarren staff are keen to ensure that work with secondary groups remains embedded in the ethos of the Pendarren Experience and, to this end, would welcome any applications for alternative secondary group visits. As well as working with achieving students, Pendarren can offer courses for those students who underachieve for a variety of reasons, including social, emotional or behavioural difficulties. In many cases an intense, short stay residential experience is beneficial for the student and the school.

If you have a group who would benefit from a visit to Pendarren and who would not fit in with the normal Monday to Friday programme, please get in touch. We would like to discuss any alternative ways of accommodating your group.



If you still have doubts, please take time to read the following message from Ms Henning (Humanities Department) and Mr Atherton (Headteacher) at Park View:

What can Pendarren offer secondary students?

"Pendarren offers an opportunity for students in Haringey to go on a journey of self discovery. Bounds Green Junior School 17-21 December 2012

St Mary's Priory School 14-18 January 2013

The children from St Mary's Priory had an exciting week. They excelled in all the activities

by overcoming problems with the weather using good humour, dressing well and being patient. The groups were able to follow their programme and the children's great spirit and ability to accept the challenges thrown at them were a credit to themselves, their staff and school. There were some good falls of snow on the mountains during the week and the snow made for some interesting river studies but they were able to get to the caves in order to study the limestone and the river carving through it. (This gave Sara a very exciting birthday). The staff and pupils were incredibly organised and very helpful on the Friday due to a red Meteorological Office weather warning of heavy snowfall on Friday. They were up and had left Pendarren by 3.40 am! They were back in Haringey by 7.30 am - which was great as by 12.30 pm, when the coach normally leaves, we had 15cm of snow in the car park!



The Green CE Primary School (now Holy Trinity CE Primary School) 14-18 January 2013

The Green had a great week at Pendarren House. The pupils wrapped up warmly each day before embarking on their activities. A programmed mixture of education and adventure delivered 5 days of challenge, development and fun for the Year 6 group. Pupils sent back wonderful reports detailing their experiences. South Harringay Junior School 21-25 January 2013

South Harringay Junior School certainly experienced the fantastic snow that Wales has to offer. The activities carried on regardless (albeit a little modified and with lots of warm clothes) and the children had a great time learning about rivers, developing their teamwork skills on the high ropes and studying the sea creatures they had caught at the beach. To take the minibuses to Swansea for the coastal visit they first had to clear 25 cm of snow from their roofs! Alfred Wainwright once said "there is no such thing as bad weather, just bad clothing". We definitely proved that correct this week. The children were wrapped up in many layers and with hats, gloves and scarves there was no stopping them even in the deepest snow! A great time was had by staff and students alike. One pupil wrote of his trip:

Belmont Junior School 21-25 January 2013

Alexandra Park School A2 Level Geography Trip 31 January – 2 February 2013

Alexandra Park Sixth Form students came for a Thursday to Saturday fieldwork course, focussing on Cold Environments -Landscapes and Change, plus the World of Cultural Diversity. The students had a trip around Abergavenny, an ancient market town, and met up with local A Level students from King Henry VIII School for a discussion on cultural differences. The following day they climbed Pen y Fan looking at the relict landscape, shaped by the last glacial period 14 - 18,000 years ago, to get an understanding of how the physical process shaped our landscapes and how we now use them. The course was rounded off with an underground exploration on Saturday in Ogof Clogwyn, exploring the geology of the limestone of South Wales.



Pendarren work experience placements are organised through the Haringey Education Business Partnership. We try to offer as many work placements as we can throughout the school year, subject to there being suitable school groups to work with. If you think you would like to do your work experience placement at Pendarren, or if you have a student who would like to do so, please talk to your school work experience co-ordinator who should contact Haringey Education Business Partnership on 020 8352 5917.

We have accommodation for two students sharing a bedroom, so same sex pairs are welcomed. Transport can be arranged on our coach, travelling with the visiting schools, but this is subject to there being sufficient seats available. Alternatively, students can travel by train from Paddington to Abergavenny where we can arrange to collect from the station.

Students coming to Pendarren should be aware of the type of placement they will be carrying out. A placement will be a Monday to Friday residential and students will be expected to help out with all aspects of a residential visit — including helping the duty instructor with evening duties. Their placement will involve observing and aiding instructors to deliver an outdoor activity programme which may not involve taking part in the activities themselves. For students interested in careers in the outdoors or working with children, this placement can be invaluable.
